These drawings were found in La Pileta cave in Spain and could be up to 25,000 years old.

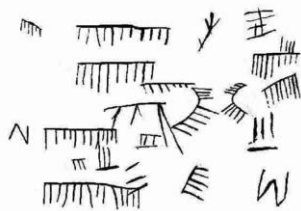
Stone Age Counting

What might 'Stone Age' people count?

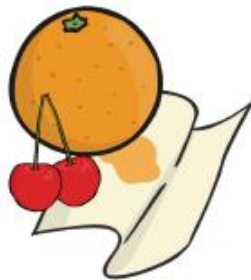
Try making up your own way of recording counting.

Ask your mum or dad if they have a spare white t-shirt and have a go at dyeing the t-shirt with the different colours. Which ones worked the best? Can you annotate your work just like we do in our sketch books?
